"When the pandemic hit and we were able to use that to put in place more stringent managed intake policies, we were able to see a true difference in our ability to meet the 5 Freedoms, truly care for the animals, reduce LOS, and also reduce our Net County Cost...Basically, a series of emergencies and tragedies allowed us to push forward programming that led the shelter from a 50% save rate and a population of 100+ cats and 120+ dogs on any given day to a shelter with 0-20 cats and 20-40 dogs on any given day, 95% save rate for 2021 so far...enrichment programs, play groups, portalized cat kennels, virtually zero disease outbreaks, better relationship with our community...you name it."

The time that best allows services to be provided in alignment with animal and human need *and* shelter capacity


Batching for a new normal

- Compress activities into shorter windows to more efficiently use limited staff
- Set aside dedicated time blocks for categories of activity e.g. intake, adoptions, medical rechecks, rescue
- Align timing with services and people patterns
- Use appointments to accommodate special needs outside of normal hours



The power of a pause

- Building in a pause can allow people to dig a little deeper beyond their first instinct/immediate emotional reaction/comfort zone
- In the pause, learning can occur and the right response can be chosen
- Wait til 8 for kittens, Wait 48 for found pets, and...






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NACA Guideline on Appointment-Based Pet Intake into Shelters

The outdated practice of unscheduled intake leads to a number of negative impacts (See Appendix A). Some of the consequences of on-demand, immediate intake include animals being unnecessarily impounded; families and pets being needlessly and often permanently separated; increased stress, disease, and death in shelter animals; poor customer experience; compromised staffing efficiency; and decreased organizational effectiveness.

Given the numerous harms and risks associated with unscheduled intake, we recommend all animal shelters replace this practice with an appointment-based system that includes individual assessment and a case management approach for all non-emergency requests.



What is the Right Place?



The place permitting the best possible result for the animal(s) and person(s) in the most humane and efficient possible way

The Cat Pants principle


- Even when there's plenty of room at the shelter, home is usually better than a kennel or a cage
- Keeping a pet, rehoming a pet, caring for found kittens and finding a lost pet's owner are reusable and communicable skills
- Built in pause makes space to try



The vacuum effect

 Supporting animals to be healthy and safe where they are, instead of removing them, tends to stabilize populations and reduce the new

migrating/breeding/buying that otherwise replaces removed individuals




"Contrary to expectation, the relative abundance and activity of feral cats increased in the cull-sites, even though the numbers of cats captured per unit effort during the culling period declined. Increases in minimum numbers of cats known to be alive ranged from 75% to 211% during the culling period, compared with pre- and post-cull estimates."




Animal Control Intake of Free-Roaming Cats

It is the position [policy] of the National Animal Care & Control Association that, at every opportunity, officers should [will] work to educate the public regarding humane and responsible co-existence and care of pet and community cats, to include education on the benefits and resources for spay/neuter and vaccination; responsible feeding and management practices for those choosing to care for community cats; and effective methods to humanely deter and exclude animals from homes, structures and targeted areas. It is the position of NACA that indiscriminate pick up or admission of healthy, free-roaming cats, regardless of temperament, for any purpose other than TNR/SNR, fails to serve commonly held goals of community animal management and protection programs and, as such, is a misuse of time and public funds and should be avoided.



What is the right care?





Within the community

- Access to care for pets and families
- Communication to ensure that animals that need shelter help can get it
- •Within the sheltering system
 - Shelters have the opportunity to plan, create, communicate and sustain programs to provide care where it is needed
- •Within the shelter itself
 - Safety, health, and well being is provided for animals and staff
 - 5 freedoms, ASV Guidelines are places to start



Staffing in all areas is adequate to provide for routine needs, individual care and accommodate fluctuations in intake levels and routine staff turnover/absence without overwork, and there is time to work on protocols, training or other methods to improve internal processes and/or invest in community health

E.g. staff in all departments are able to attend professional development training or networking events; the shelter team periodically steps back from day to day processes to evaluate and plan; proactive community programs and methods to reduce the number of animals requiring shelter care, such as safety net and foster programs, are developed and continually improved

OUR TEAMS AND THE ANIMALS DESERVE THIS

Our population has been manageable for over a year (ranging from 30 to 75 animals) on a daily basis. In prior years we averaged over 300 animals daily. Staff morale has increased and compassionate care is being displayed. Enrichment for all animals is top priority and workplace expectations are the normal mindset now.








Fig. 5. Margins plot showing the probability of a cat having an outcome of shelter death (euthanized or died) prior to implementation of the C4C model compared to after implementation at all three shelters (A, B, and C).

The vacuum effect revisited

- Removing animals from habitat, homes, neighborhoods or communities without changing anything at the point of origin, will chronically destabilize homes and populations
- Every animal returned builds a bridge and holds a spot






Animal Care Officer Robert Lopez makes initial contact with a stray dog and her four puppies discovered on Quintana Road while making

the streets of San Antonio actually belong to somebody.


