What do the numbers say?

2023 Data from Shelter Animals Count (SAC) (For shelters with stray intake contracts only.)


- Overall dog intake = 723,281
- Stray dog intake = 543,265
- Stray dogs returned = 192,000
- Strays NOT returned: 543,265-192,000=351,015

What is YOUR number of strays not returned?

Good news???!!!

- 351,015 strays that were not returned home will need a different live outcome if they are not to be euthanized
- 391,909 total adoptions performed by this same group of shelters
- Unreturned strays used up about 90% of ALL adoptions :-0

~ Percent of unreturned stray dogs out of total adoptions

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What if.....

- More dogs left the shelter in less than half the length of stay (or no length of stay at all)?
- Half as many dogs needed to find adoptive homes?
- What would you do with all that glorious time and space?



What barriers have to come down?

Knowing the animal might be at a shelter

Accessing the internet to find out more

Speaking the language(s) describing the details of how to navigate the reclaim process

Finding the time to get to the shelter during open hours

Finding transportation to the shelter (and back home with the pet)

Overcoming reluctance/fear of going to a place where people wear uniforms and badges

Overcoming reluctance to come get an unruly teenage pet that has gotten on their last nerve lately



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How can we calculate what we don't know?

- What is our RTO rate?
- Returns divided by WHAT?
- What's our denominator in this equation?
- All intakes? (probably not)
- Stray intakes? (maybe)
- "True Strays" yes, but...
- How do we even know the number of "True Strays?"



What is the path that we've shaped?


- Policy
- Cost
- Waiting time/appointment required
- Transportation
- Emotional experience
- What else?



Shaping the path for success...

- 1 in 6 dogs admitted are relinquished by their

 owners
- 1 in 6 come in by some other means (transfer or custody)
- 4 in 6 come in as stray
- The vast majority of dogs admitted to shelters are not there either by the intention OR the acknowledgement of their owners
- Supporting owners to keep pets only work for owner-intended and acknowledged intake



What are the benefits of owner surrenders coming in as known owner surrenders instead of "strays"

- Able to get information on animal
 - Medical info
 - Behavioral info
 - Previous environment info
- Builds an open and honest relationship with members of your community.
- Honors the difficult decision the owner has had to make.
- Allows you to be better able to figure out your true "Stray RTO" rate over time.
