HAVE FUN WITH YOUR FOSTER

- **Try something new!** It's not all pictures and videos. Write a fairy tale with your foster as the heroine. Build a resume for his dream job of family pet. Maybe your foster rewrote a popular song to be about himself and needs your help performing it; won't you help with that special solo?

TRY A BIO!
