Number of Animals Housed And LOS





- → More individuals waiting does not change the rate of outcome (in many cases it slows the rate...)
- → For a given rate of outcomes, *length of time* waiting is determined by the *number* of individuals waiting
- → Fewer better quality housing units means fewer individuals waiting -
 - Fewer housed at any one time can equal the same number overall

Curiosity

True curiosity is not trying to understand something or someone with a preconceived goal or to try to control the outcome.

True curiosity requires the willingness to give up EVERYTHING we've ever known or believed.

- Acknowledging and accepting fears
- Allows deeper connection with others
- Gives you an ability to discover solutions to problems

- Currently staffing level for basic animal care
- Outcomes by type for dogs and cats
